Dr John Boyd has received a VCHRI Innovation and Translational Research Award from the Vancouver Coastal Health Research Institute to **assess the safety and feasibility of a 10-week aerobic exercise training program for sepsis survivors**. Learn more <u>here</u>.

A team from the <u>Sepsis CoLab</u>, the <u>Centre</u> for International Child Health, and UBC have been awarded a <u>Data Champions Pilot</u> <u>Project</u> grant from the Digital Research Alliance of Canada for **optimizing the reuse of clinical data** to improve maternal, newborn, and child health. Anemia and adverse outcomes in pregnancy: subgroup analysis of the CLIP cluster-randomized trial in India.

Iron-deficiency anemia is a known risk factor for several adverse perinatal outcomes, but data on its impact on specific maternal morbidities is less robust. In this subgroup analysis, no significant association was found between anemia severity and haemorrhage (antepartum or postpartum) or sepsis, but there was a an association between anemia severity and pregnancy hypertension.

The responsibility to care: lessons learned from emergency department workers' perspectives during the first wave of the COVID-19 pandemic in Canada.

In this qualitative study at 9 Canadian EDs, ED workers reported that they felt a responsibility to provide care through a pandemic, they wanted to be engaged in decision-making, and work during the pandemic created new sources of moral distress and fatigue. This work can inform practices to help protect from burnout and ensure the suistainability of the health workforce.

Antimicrobial treatment duration for uncomplicated bloodstream infections in critically ill children: a multicentre observational study.

Bloodstream infections (BSIs) cause significant morbidity and mortality in critically

ill children but treatment duration is understudied. In this retrospective observational study in 6 PICUs, most critically ill children with BSIs received at least two weeks of antimicrobial treatment, but further study is needed to determine whether shorter duration therapy would be effective for selected critically ill children.
