Publication Spotlights

Characteristics and Timing of Mortality in Children Dying With Infections in North American PICUs

Johnson, K. T. ; Görges, M. ; Murthy, S.

In this publication, the authors analyzed clinical records from 130 PICUs across North America. They found that a substantial proportion of children admitted to PICU with severe infections die early (<1 day of PICU admission) and these children differ from those dying later in diagnoses, procedures, and admitting location. The emergency department is a key source of critically ill patients. Read here!

Intravenous immune globulin in septic shock: a Canadian national survey of critical care medicine and infectious disease specialist

This national survey evaluated the perceived efficacy and safety of intravenous immune globulin (IVIG) in septic shock, self-reported utilization patterns, barriers to use, the population of interest for further trials and willingness to participate in future research of IVIG in septic shock. Most Canadian critical care and infectious diseases specialist physicians reported previous experience using IVIG in septic shock, and survey respondents identified inadequacy of existing research as the greatest barrier to routine use of IVIG in septic shock

Global incidence and mortality of neonatal sepsis: a systematic review and meta-analysis.

Here, the authors extended previous estimates of global neonatal incidence by including additional data from low- and middle-income countries. From 1979-2019, the incidence of neonatal sepsis was 824 (95% CI 1892 to 4194) cases per 100 000 live births, of which an estimated 17.6% 9 (95% CI 10.3% to 28.6%) died. However, its incidence remains unknown in most countries and existing studies show marked heterogeneity, indicating the need to increase the number of epidemiological studies, harmonise neonatal sepsis definitions and improve the quality of research in this field.
