




Launch of the MOSAIC Study

Vaccines are an essential line of defense against sepsis The national MOSAIC (Mix and match of the second COVID-19 vaccine dose for SAfety and ImmunogeniCity) Study, co-led by Dr. Manish Sadarangani and Dr Joanne Langley, is evaluating the safety and effectiveness of combining two different COVID-19 vaccines for the first and second doses as well as the impacts of increasing the time interval between doses. Updates from the Pediatric Sepsis Data CoLaboratory

The Pediatric Sepsis Data CoLaboratory



(Sepsis CoLab) is an international datasharing network of experts collaborating to address the high burden of pediatric sepsis mortality and morbidity globally. Since its launch in Fall 2020, the Sepsis CoLab has welcomed 79 new members, published a paper on common data elements for predictors of pediatric sepsis, and has established a virtual platform on Scholars Portal Dataverse for high quality data collection and sharing. This will enable improved modelling and analytics, drive quality improvement in clinical care, and

facilitate a community for sharing best practices and for advocacy globally. Throughout 2021 and beyond, the Sepsis CoLab plans to conduct their 5-survey environmental scan to determine baseline readiness to provide pediatric sepsis care in health facilities in Cameroon, Uganda, and Latin America.


SPEAK UP!: BUILDING A RESPECTFUL AND INCLUSIVE WORKPLACE

Antimicrobial resistance research in a post-pandemic world: Insights on antimicrobial resistance research in the COVID-19 pandemic

In this article, the authors highlight pandemic-related disruptions to AMR surveillance and the high antibiotic use in COVID-19 patients. There is a need for future studies assessing new or evolving AMR at the local, national, and international scale, and an opportunity for the AMR research community to leverage increased awareness of the importance of infectious diseases to promote good practices for controlling AMR transmission.

Neither Blood Culture Positivity nor Time to Positivity Is

In this multi-center study, blood cultures were taken in patients with severe sepsis before and after antibiotics administration. These cultures were assessed for bacteremia, persistent bacteremia, and time to positivity in bacteremic patients. The authors found that these markers were not associated with 90-day mortality.
